This Month in AA History

Dec 1 1940 - Chicago Daily Tribune begins a series of articles on AA by Nall Hamilton.

Dec 10 1975 - Birds of a Feather AA group for pilots is formed.

Dec 11 1934 – Bill admitted to Towns Hospital for the fourth and last time (fall '33, '34 in summer, midsummer and final admittance).

Dec 11 1941 - Dallas Morning News reports first AA group formed in Dallas.

Dec 12 1934 - Bill has Spiritual Experience at Towns Hospital.

Dec 13 or 14 1934 – Ebby visits Bill at Towns hospital, brings William James' book, Varieties of Religious Experience.

Other December happenings with no specific date:

Dec 1934 to May 1935 – Bill works with alcoholics, but fails to sober any of them. Lois reminds him HE is sober.

The Oxford Group and the 4 Absolutes

The Oxford Group influenced the structure of Alcoholic Anonymous.

AA's suggested steps of recovery came from a first century Christian fellowship, founded in 1921 by a Lutheran Minister, Dr. Frank Buchman and Rev. Samuel Shoemaker. This fellowship changed its name to the Oxford Group in 1928.

The Oxford Group had 4 absolutes:

- Absolute Honesty
- Absolute Purity
- Absolute Unselfishness
- Absolute Love

Many men and women found recovery from alcoholism in the Oxford Group.

To be spiritually reborn and to live in the state in which these 4 points are the guides to our life in God. The Oxford Group advocate four practical spiritual activities:

- The sharing of our sins and temptations with another Christian life given to God and to use sharing as witness to help others, still unchanged, to recognize and acknowledge their sins.
- 2. The surrender of our life, past, present and future, into God's keeping and direction.
- 3. Restitution to all whom we have wronged directly or indirectly.
- Listening to, accepting, relying on God's guidance and carrying it out in everything we do or say, great or small.
